Business Women's Day

September 22 marked American Business Women's Day, but you can support women in business, womenowned businesses, and women entrepreneurs all year round. Check out this list of local, women-owned shops ranging from book stores to breweries.

Yom Kippur in Prospect Park

Celebrate Yom Kippur at the Prospect Park Audubon Center on October 5 with carousel rides, educational programs, a guided bird walk and more. Attendees will be immersed in nature, sampling pond water, testing quality and learning about the local wildlife.

Rosh Hashanah at Brooklyn Bowl
